## A Word from our Director



With a college education in management, Mr. Ronald Lepage holds a certificate in philanthropic management and a certificate in drug addiction treatment Université de Montréal, For many years, he successfully and passionately led a community organization in the region of Abitibi-Témiscamingue. At La Sortie, he is tasked with all the operations of the organization and with setting up assistance and support services for the victims.

On September 1st 2018, The Way Out finally opened the gates to the survivor's residence. The residence works in unison with the "Alternative to the Sex Industry" program, which primarily focuses on providing access to 24-hour services and instant access to a way out from the sex industry. One call or text message is enough to be able to reach and help a victim within a matter of hours. The Way Out wants to thank Lyne, our residence attendant who took on the challenge of staying at the house with the women 24/7, and to Maylissa, intervener and survivor, who has been helping the victims to reintegrate into society.

As for our research department, Project Horizon is now concluded. The objectives of this research project were to develop effective housing intervention models for victims of sexual exploitation. Mission accomplished, for with a sample of 548 respondents, this research provides important insight on their needs. Thanks to Maria Mourani for conducting the research with excellence. We also want to thank Pascal for editing and uploading the report, Esther for French correction, as well as Matthew for translation.

There was a great level of interest and commitment at the 2018 edition of the Gala La Sortie, thanks to the participation of Laurence Latreille and Marlyne Barrett. I want to thank Esther and the whole team involved in organising, as the event greatly contributed to our efforts towards educating the public and raising awareness.

# Alternative to the Sex Industry Program

 Provide services of help and support for the social reintegration of victims of sexual exploitation.

More precisely, we are proposing a support system for women in the Montreal region making the decision to leave the sex industry until they regain complete independence. The program enables these women to earn a stable life. They are directed towards services appropriate to their needs and receive help acquiring the skills necessary for their full development.

#### I. OBJECTIVES

- Provide an alternative to the sex industry
- Orientate them towards social service networks
- Stabilise medical, financial and socio-judicial situations
- Find good housing, support groups and rewarding work
- Develop social and professional skills

#### 2. WAYS TO ACCESS THE SERVICE

- Primary workers such as police officers, street workers, CLSC or other
- Local activities offering resources to encourage connections to women
- Website and web optimisation
- Word of mouth from women in the sex industry

#### 3. SERVICES

Reception, Evaluation, Orientation (REO). 24/7 reception allows easy access, and evaluation determines the service needs of the participant in order to respond with precision to her needs, and finally, orientation guides them towards the most appropriate services. To do this, La Sortie employs standardised tools such as RESO, DÉBA, WEISS.

Individual support is defined by regular follow-ups and weekly meetings with survivors wishing to leave the sex industry. They are assigned to build plan of action, which includes objectives they have set for themselves, and are guided towards the means and resources that may be used to achieve these goals, following individually achievable deadlines.

Group workshops cover a variety of topics through partnered discussion aimed at personal growth, such as self-esteem and communication.

THEMATIC WORKSHOPS

3 I

Covered subjects: re-appropriation of their sexuality and boundaries, conflict management, self-esteem, community life organisation.

Social integration activities are defined by participants exercising their roles on personal, social, academic and professional levels. Participants are given the necessary skills to live among society. For example, a participant wishing to come out of isolation and eager to increase communication skills is encouraged to join a support group.

# Temporary Housing Program

Provide a temporary housing service and accommodation to victims of sexual exploitation

This service is comprised of the house in the Vaudreuil-Soulange region, including all the amenities of a regular residence, with meals, for up to a year or more. Since September 1st, 2018, this initiative unprecedented in Quebec can permanently host five women victims of sexual exploitation. Only a woman with severe and persistent mental health issues is redirected to other services. In any event, this 24/7 service quickly presented itself as a necessity, since just two weeks after its grand opening, all the available spots were filled. As of now, we are the only resource in the province of Quebec offering housing specifically adapted to these young women. In addition to bedrooms, the house also features two kitchens, two living rooms and two bathrooms, all located on private land away from urban activity. Resident survivors are not micro-managed and are therefore independent and free to choose their own activities. It is their home. However, they are asked to follow guidelines for their own well-being and the well-being of other residents.

## Prevention

Provide prevention activities for persons at risk of sexual exploitation

#### **EARLY INTERVENTION**

Early intervention aims at reducing health and social problems through action around factors of risk and vulnerability. This approach consists in a package of measures to be taken as soon as integration (or even the appearance of a risk of integration) into the sex industry arise.

#### **16 WOMEN**

REACHED THROUGH LOCAL ACTIVITIES

We have made direct contact with women in the industry in the Hochelaga Maisonneuve neighborhood. The goal is to be there to listen and offer services if they express that need. Thanks to "Purse of Hope" initiative for their bags full of useful items which we have given to the women.

#### 2 WOMEN

REACHED THROUGH VOLUNTEER HELP La Sortie began a citizens initiative and functions mostly in part due to volunteer resources. Although, because the organization has paid staff to do prevention work with victims of sexual exploitation, the volunteers' contribution is now directed towards awareness. These contacts were made directly in proximity.

#### **325 WOMEN**

REACHED THROUGH SOCIAL MEDIA Many of our Facebook followers are young girls between the ages of 13-25. Girls in this age bracket are statistically at a higher risk of sexual exploitation in Canada and have been prevented by getting informed and interacting with us.

## Awareness and Research

 Provide the public with awareness-raising and educational activities demonstrating the reality and needs of victims of sexual exploitation.

Lack of knowledge of this phenomenon and the types of services we offer requires that we pay greater attention to devising strategies and tools for raising awareness. #### 3. STUDY ON HOUSING NEEDS

#### Projet Horizon

Started in October 2016, the project identifies and exposes the housing needs of victims of sexual exploitation in Ouebec.

The year 2018-2019 consisted of data collection, analysis, as well as written report. A record number of 548 questionnaires in both official languages were completed by women still in the sex industry and by survivors who left the industry. Following data analysis, the Housing First approach appears to suit at best the needs of female victims of sexual exploitation. This approach consists of quickly providing permanent housing, and this, without any preconditions or prior steps. The report is translated into both languages, also available in abridged form, and is fully available on our website. Additionally, the illustrations and highlights of the report have been formatted as a drop-down menu to expedite information access. Here are our main findings:

- The residential situation of those surveyed is rather precarious and unstable. In fact, the vast majority of respondents do not live in their own apartment, house or subsidised housing. More than half do not reside in their own apartment or house without subsidies, and more than one third reside in the same place for less than six months.
- Consequently, many of the women and girls in the study want subsidised housing (low-income housing, Federation of NGO Housing of Montreal) or a rent subsidy. They want residential stability at a low cost.
- Temporary housing was not a preferential choice. Ideally, these women would like permanent housing.
- Most respondents rejected housing models involving a restriction on their autonomy, while those who were willing to cohabit with women were not in prostitution.
- Regardless of the type of accommodation, these women request security access (intercom, camera, etc.) and a security guard in their building.



Maria Mourani, President and Founder of Mourani-Criminologie, is the doctoral researcher responsible for the study. She is a criminologist and sociologist specializing in the issues of human trafficking, prostitution and criminal groups. She holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Clinical Criminology and a Master's degree in Sociology, both completed at Université de Montréal. She is currently completing her PhD in Sociological and Anthropological Studies at the Faculty of Social Sciences at the University of Ottawa.




